The ATS International Conference is just one of many different ways to engage and stay active in the ATS Community throughout the year. We also invite you to:


- Submit session proposals for the 2025 International Conference in late June. This is your chance to shape the content of next year's conference!

These are due in late July, and are a great way to deepen your involvement in ATS.

 opportunities in ATS.
- Submit abstracts for ATS 2025--usually due in late October or early November.

- Advocate and support the missions of the critical care community of patients and providers at the federal and state government levels with our ATS advocacy groups.

PLANNING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Critical Care Assembly Planning Committee reviewed and supported several excellent project proposals in August and September, including Workshop Reports, Research Statements, and Clinical Practice Guidelines spanning a wide range of important topics. We are thrilled that **three new projects** were ultimately selected by the ATS Program Review Committee for official ATS sponsorship: "A Research Agenda to Mitigate Racial and Ethnic Disparities in US Critical Care Medicine," "Management of Noninvasive Respiratory Support for Acute Respiratory Failure," "Physical Rehabilitation and Mobilization for Critically III Adult Patients, a joint ATS/ERS Clinical Practice Guideline." Additionally, "Mechanical Ventilation in Adults with ARDS: A Clinical Practice Guideline Update" was supported for renewal, and the final official document was published this past fall. We thank the Assembly for submitting so many outstanding and important proposals; we encourage all members to submit proposals for Workshop Reports, Clinical Practice Guidelines, Clinical Practice Statement, Policy Statements, or Research Statements in June/July 2024.

In February, the Planning Committee reviewed the roster of Critical Care Assembly Official Documents for currency. Evidence in critical care is always rapidly evolving, and sunsetting documents that have been eclipsed by new data is as important as welcoming new documents. Two of the oldest clinical statements were reviewed in detail: "ICU-Acquired Weakness: An ATS Clinical Practice Guideline, 2014," and "The Choosing Wisely Top 5 List in Critical Care Medicine: An Official ATS/AACN/ACCP/SCCM Statement, 2014." Committee members identified opportunities for future official ATS projects, but ultimately felt like both documents remain relevant to today's clinical practice and knowledge base.

In March, the Planning Committee will review nominations for the Critical Care Assembly Awards. We look forward to reviewing the exceptional group of nominees for the prestigious Early Career Achievement, International Early Career Achievement, Mid-Career Achievement, and Extraordinary Achievement Awards.

Finally, last year, the Planning Committee initiated a standardized process by which it accepts new members in order to improve transparency, equity, and balance within the Committee. We have continued the same process this year and appreciate all who submitted applications. We will be selecting our new members later this month and will announce them to the assembly at our membership meeting in San Diego this May.
